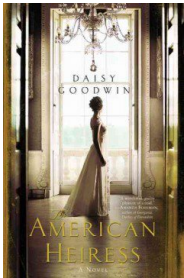

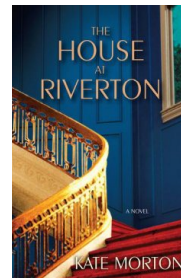

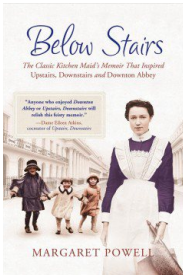
The American Heiress by Daisy Goodwin

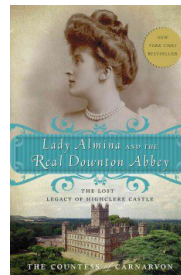
The House at Riverton by Kate Morton

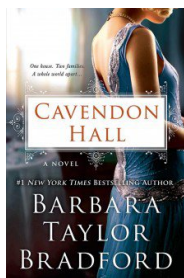
Below Stairs by Margaret Powell

Margaret Powell's classic memoir of her time in service is the remarkable true story of an indomitable woman who, though she served in the great houses of England, never stopped aiming high.



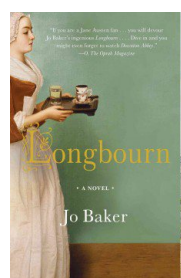
Lady Almina and the Real Downton Abbey by the Countess of Carnarvon

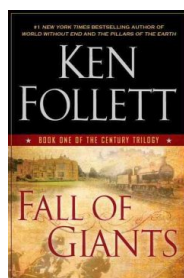
Cavendon Hall by Barbara Taylor Bradford

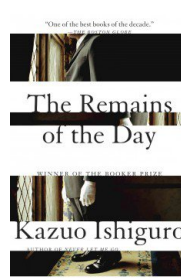
Longbourn by Jo Baker
