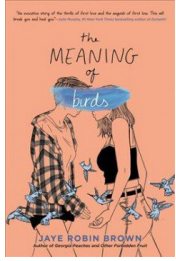

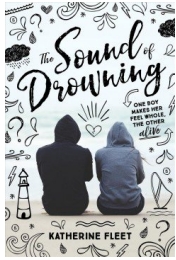


The Meaning of Birds

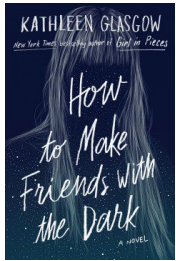


The Sound of Drowning

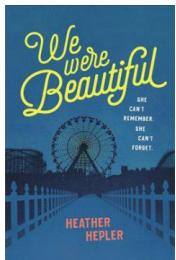

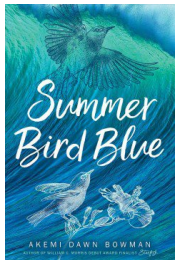


We Were Beautiful

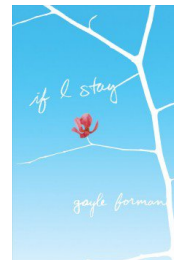


Teach Me to Forget

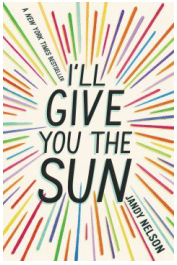

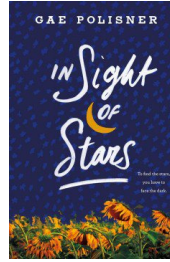


I'll Give You the Sun

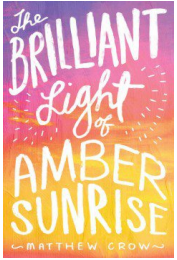


In Sight of Stars

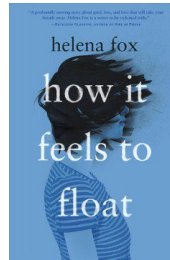


The Brilliant Light of Amber Sunrise

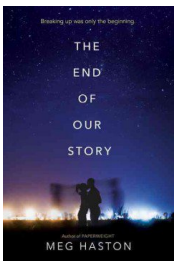


How it Feels to Float

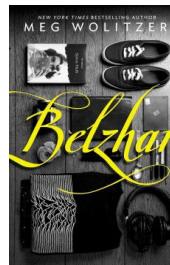


The End of Our Story

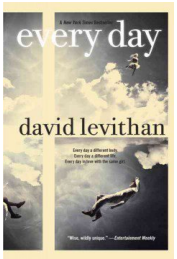

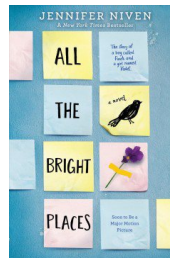


Every Day

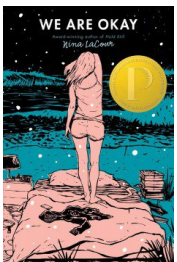


All the Bright Places

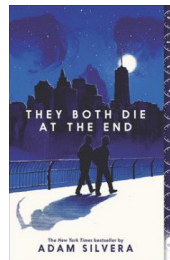

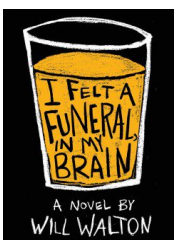
