


The Birchbark House


When their father invites a mail-order bride to come live with them in their prairie home, Caleb and Anna are captivated by their new mother and hope that she will stay.




The Case of the Deadly Desperados




In her diary, thirteen-year-old Hattie chronicles her family's arduous 1847 journey from Missouri to Oregon on the Oregon Trail.






Hattie Big Sky




Lizzie Bright and the Buckminster Boy by Gary D. Schmidt In 1911, Turner Buckminster hates his new home of

The Evolution of Calpurnia Tate byJacqueline Kelly




Donnor Dinner Party

The Reed family struggles to survive the doomed wagon train journey from Illinois to California in 1846 as members of the ill-fated Donner Party.







