


#### **Shuri by Nic Stone**




#### **AWARD-WINNING BOOK**

The Origin of Life on Earth: An African Creation Myth Illustrated by 1993 Coretta Scott King Award winner Kathleen Atkins Wilson

This Yoruba creation myth begins in the heavenly court of the all-powerful and his agents, male and female orishas. All the orishas are content, save one named Obatala, whose wondering impels him to employ his power in some meaningful way. He prepares thoughtfully for this work, aided by his fellow orishas, and descends from heaven on a golden chain. This book beautifully retells the Yoruba creation myth in which the deity Obatala descends from the sky to create the world.

Set in traditional Africa, *Black Leopard, Red Wolf* is Marlon James first foray into fantasy fiction. 
