

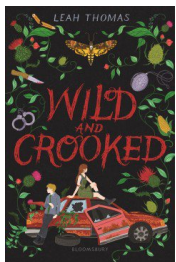

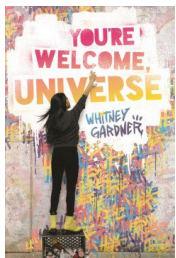

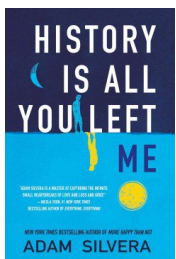

by Whitney Gardner

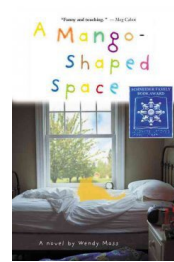

by Adam Silvera

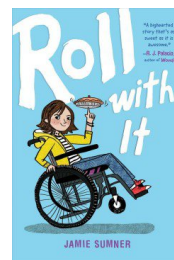

by Wendy Mass

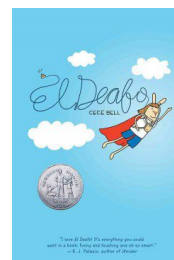

by Jamie Sumner

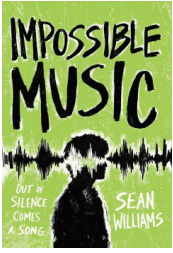

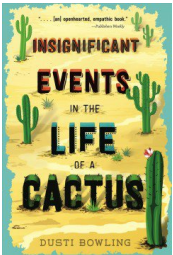
The author recounts in graphic novel format her experiences with hearing loss at a young age, including using a bulky hearing aid, learning how to lip read, and determining her "superpower."

by Sean Williams

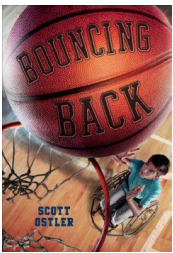

by Dusti Bowling

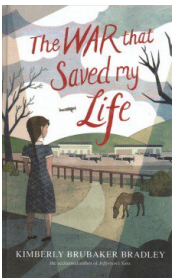

by Scott Ostler

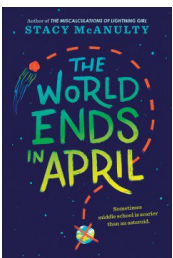

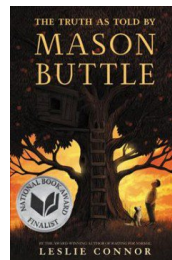

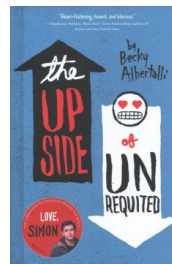
Struggling with changes that are made difficult by her Sensory Processing Disorder, young Willa is thrown for a loop when her father reveals that he has been dating her best friend's mom.
