




Four American Indian men, who shared a disturbing event during their youth, are hunted down years later by an entity bent on revenge that forces them to revisit the culture and traditions they left behind.

by Kelli Jo Ford



The round house






American history.



The plague of doves


by Louise Erdrich

weighs the legacy of a century-old crime as reflected by his own love life.




Where the dead sit talking


Code talker : a novel about the Navajo Marines of World War Two


The absolutely true diary of a part-time Indian

Budding cartoonist Junior leaves his troubled school on the Spokane Indian Reservation to attend an all-white farm town school where the only other Indian is the school mascot




House made of dawn
