

## **Family History Interview Tips**

Prepare/Plan Ahead

Have a list of information you're hoping to get, questions you want to ask, topics to cover.

- Have your recording method planned out and prepared The interview will go smoother and be more productive if you don't fumble while you're talking.
- Call ahead

Give your family member time to think about their family and anecdotes about them.

Start with a family photo or story

Show a photo of several members of your family to jog your family member's memory.

Ask open-ended questions

Instead of "Do you have brothers and sisters?", ask "Who were your brothers and sisters? Are they older or younger?"

- Toward the end, ask "closed" questions for more specific details "When was your brother born? When and where did he die?"
- ► Lead the interview

Keep the conversation focused, but listen for things you want to ask more questions about.

► Follow up after the interview

Either transcribe the interview, or listen to it a few times to take notes about family names, places they've lived, or when they were born.
