






"When teen social activist and history buff Kezi Smith is killed under mysterious circumstances after attending a social justice rally, her devastated sister Happi and their family are left reeling in the

Mudbound : a novel


by Hillary Jordan In 1946, Laura McAllan tries to adjust after moving with her husband and two children to an isolated cotton farm in the Mississipi Delta

by Sherman Alexie


Budding cartoonist Junior leaves his troubled school on the Spokane Indian Reservation to attend an all-white farm town school where the only other Indian is the school mascot



To kill a mockingbird



The handmaid's tale by Margaret Atwood




prisoner and the guard who has watched him for more than a dozen years.

by Uzodinma Iweala


