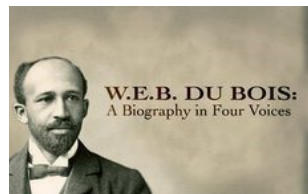

King

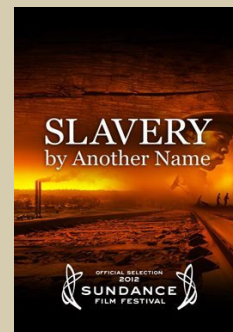

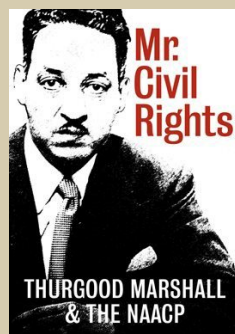


The Loving Story

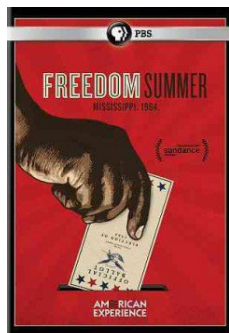

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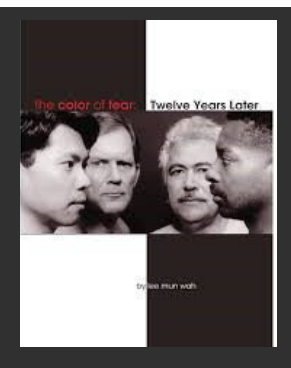
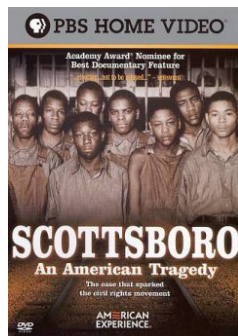


Freedom Summer

PBS presents the history of the "Scottsboro Boys," a group of African American men who were victims of a racist miscarriage of justice that became a national controversy.

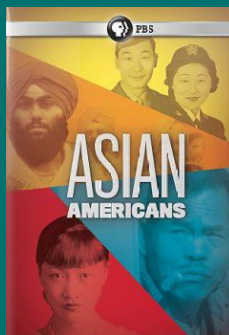
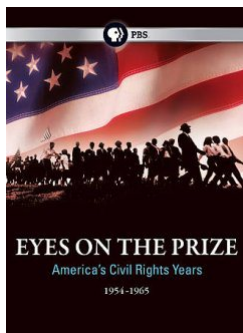


The Color of Fear

PBS presents a multi-part documentary about the American Civil Rights Movement from 1952 to 1965.

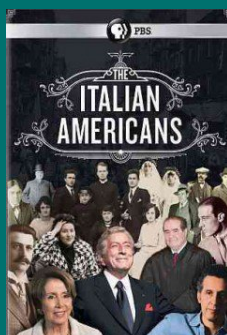


Asian Americans

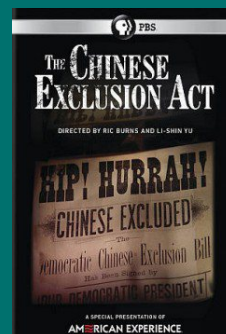


The Italian Americans

The first documentary to confront a painful and long taboo subject: the disturbing feelings many African Americans harbor about themselves and their appearance.

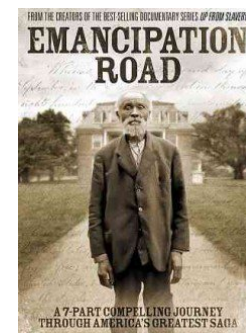


Private Violence
