#### Crenshaw


by Katherine Applegate When Jackson and his family face living in their minivan, Jackson's imaginary cat Crenshaw returns to help him.


# Sweep: the story of a girl and her monster


## Paper things

### The bridge home






# Jump back, Paul : the life and poems of Paul Laurence Dunbar
