


Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, is celebrated each year on June 19th to honor the end of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, Union general Gordon Granger read federal orders in Galveston, Texas, that all enslaved persons were now free. While the Emancipation Proclamation had formally freed all slaves in 1863, this had not always been enforced or encouraged in the South. Each year, Juneteenth honors the end of slavery in the United States and is a day to celebrate African-American history and culture.







Twelve-year-old Sarny's brutal life as a slave becomes even more dangerous when a newly arrived slave offers to teach her how to read.








To escape their oppressive Master and his hateful wife, Grace and her family flee into the Dismal Swamp, to join the other escaped slaves who live there. Novel in verse.











Recounts the journey of Black slaves to freedom via the underground railroad, an extended group of people who helped fugitive slaves in many ways.

A compilation, selected from various sources and arranged chronologically, of the reminiscences of slaves and exslaves about their experiences from the leaving of Africa through the Civil War and into the early twentieth century.

Original slave auction and plantation estate documents are used along with colorful art and poetry to contrast the monetary value of slaves with the priceless value of their life experiences and dreams, which a slave owner could never take away.

The life of the eighteenthcentury African prince who was captured by slave traders when he was 15 and brought to Massachusetts where he was a slave until he was able to buy his freedom at the age of sixty.
