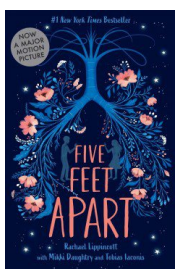




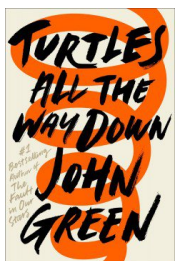

by Rachael Lippincott

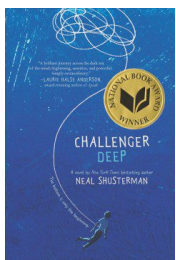

by John Green

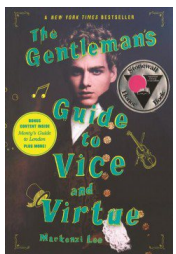

by Neal Shusterman

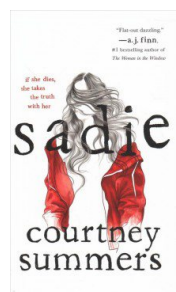

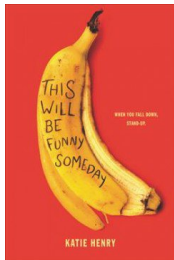


Eliza and Her Monsters
