Talk

Make

Paper Plate Dinosaurs

Materials Needed:

- Paper plate
- Paint
- Paper
- Clothespins
- Googly eyes
- Scissors
- · Glue stick
- Marker



Instructions:

- 1) Cut your paper plate in half and paint it in your desired color. This will be your dinosaur's body!
- 2) Draw and cut a dinosaur head, a tail, and spines from colored paper. Glue them to the back side of your dinosaur's body.
- 3) Attach a googly eye to your dinosaur's head, and add a mouth if desired.
- 4) Attach two clothespin legs to the bottom edge of your dinosaur.
- 5) Add spots, stripes, stickers, or anything else your dinosaur may need!

Play

If you were a dinosaur, what kind would you want to be? Are you a Tyrannosaurus Rex with big, sharp teeth? A Brontosaurus who eats leaves from top of trees? Or do you fly through the air like a Pterodactvl? Act it out to see which suits you best!
