




The Wind-up Bird Chronicle

by Paulo Coelho A fable about undauntingly following one's dream, listening to one's heart, and reading life's omens, features dialogue between a boy and an unnamed being.




Every man dies alone by Hans Fallada

Suite française


by Irène Némirovsky Published more than 60 years after the author's death at Auschwitz, a remarkable story of life under the Nazi occupation.


