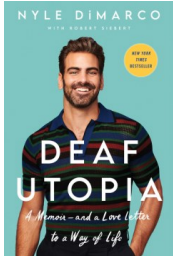


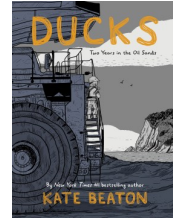

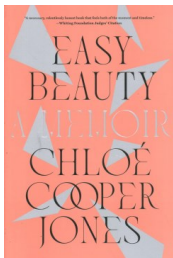

by Chloé Cooper Jones

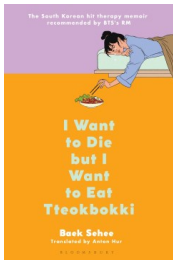
A philosophy professor and freelance journalist born with a rare congenital disease that affects both her stature and gait discusses how she navigates a world that judges and pities her appearance.

by Sehee Baek

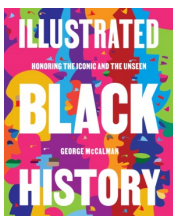

by George McCalman

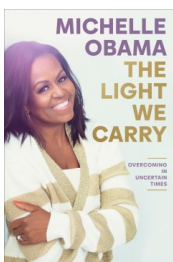

by Ingrid Rojas Contreras

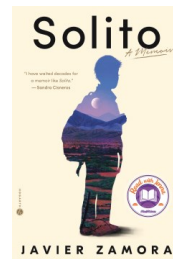

by Javier Zamora

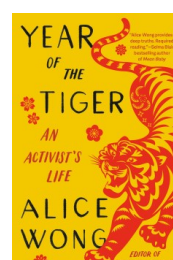
