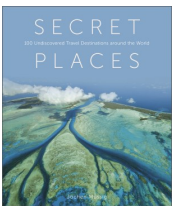
The Pacific Northwest's Best Trips

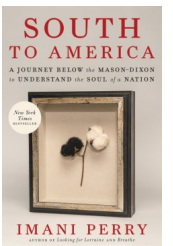
River of the Gods

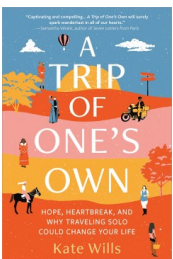
Secret Places

In a post-pandemic world, people are eager to travel again. This book is an alternative to overcrowded tourist spots and perfect for planning your crowd-free vacation.



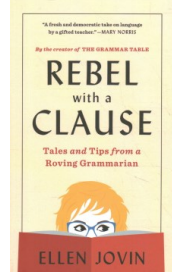
South to America

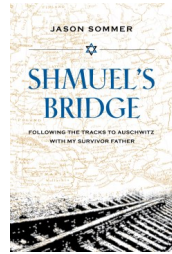
Rebel With a Clause

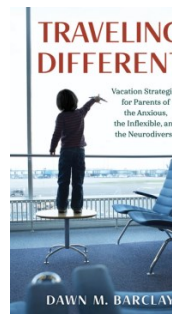
Secret Cities of Europe
