In 1915, Marta and her father are trying to get home to Germany when her father is detained and Marta is welcomed into an Irish family's home, in a story about friendship and learning to think for oneself.

by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley In 1942, with the Nazis occupying much of France, 12-year-old Miriam, who is Jewish, escapes to a school near the famous Chateau de Chenonceau where she is given a deadly task and encounters the person who will save her life and countless others.



One Big Open Sky

by Lesa Cline-Ransome In 1879, Lettie, her mother, and teacher Philomena, who are free from slavery but bound by poverty, access to opportunity and a patriarchal society, head westward on a perilous wagon journey that could cost them everything they have — including their lives.

and children and families are caught up in the inescapable violence.




The Plot to Kill a Queen: A Royal Spy Story in Three Acts
